INTRODUCTION.

THE gathering of the materials of which the Catalogues of the Exhibition are composed, and their preparation for publication in a collected form, require a short notice. By a decision of the Executive Committee, each exhibitor was called upon to furnish a written account of the articles proposed to be exhibited, and to forward this description for the purpose of forming the Catalogue of the Exhibition. In order to facilitate this operation, certain general rules were printed, together with suggestions intended to furnish exhibitors with headings under which additional information might be given. In addition, four distinct kinds of printed forms were supplied to exhibitors, intended to serve for their manuscript descriptions in each of the four sections of the Exhibition—Raw Materials and Produce, Machinery, Manufactures, and Fine Arts. These forms were required to be sent in prior to the receipt of goods at the Building, and on their arrival an acknowledgment forwarded served as a warrant for the admission of the articles described into the Exhibition.

The material of the Catalogues was thus obtained, but the form in which it appeared was such as to require very considerable modification before it could be issued from the press. The necessity for reducing the size of the Catalogues to one of convenience for use in the Building demanded that the material of which they were to be composed should be considerably condensed. The danger of inaccuracy also in the scientific descriptions, and in their literary construction, required attention. A

slight preliminary correction was applied to the forms, which were then set up in type,

The desirableness of obtaining a symmetry of proportion in the works, and as far as possible a harmony of style and consistency of expression, in addition to the great importance of attempting to communicate to them a character of scientific accuracy, demanded the adoption of general principles of correction and reconstruction. But the varied nature of the contents of the Exhibition, and of the descriptions supplied, rendered this a duty difficult to be undertaken by any single individual. A number of scientific gentlemen accordingly united to undertake the correction of proofs belonging to certain departments, principally in regard to the scientific inaccuracies they might contain, their labours being followed by a final, general, scientific and literary revision. The descriptions of exhibitors were therefore submitted to this process, and subsequently prepared for press after receiving the official sanction for their publication. In the Descriptive and Illustrated Catalogue a number of elucidatory notes were supplied, which are intended to convey a variety of interesting and valuable information upon articles exhibited.

In this manner the large Catalogue was prepared. The present volume is a very condensed abstract of that work. It consists of essentially the same materials as the former Catalogue, having been prepared by Mr. G. W. Yapp from the corrected and annotated slips, and it has therefore the advantage of the care bestowed upon the former work. Three or four lines, on the average, being, for economy of space, the necessary limit of the descriptions in this Catalogue, its contents are confined, in the case of each exhibitor, merely to a brief indication of the name, residence, nature of the article, and position in the Building. The fuller details, accompanied with the illustrations, are to

be found in the large Catalogue.

The extreme pressure of time under which the preparation of this Catalogue has proceeded, occasioned in a great measure by the delay of the return of forms, precludes the possibility of its complete accuracy. It is therefore requested that exhibitors will point out any errors presenting themselves, and without delay communicate the information, with the Class, Number, and the page in which they occur, to the Catalogue Office.

OUTLINE OF CONTENTS OF THE BUILDING.

The Building lies East and West, and is intersected by the Transept running North and South. The Transept being taken as a point of departure, the

building is divisible into two portions

The western half is appropriated to the productions of the United Kingdom, India, and the Colonies.
 The cestern half to Foreign Countries.

CONTENTS OF TRANSPIR.

Ornamental iron gates, various objects of sculpture, large glass fountain, other fountains, and ornamental gates. The refreshment court is at the north extremity. The offices of the Royal Commissioners and the Executive are at the southern entrance.

WHITEH HALF .- Ground Floor.

Proceeding towards the west along the nave, or central avenue, are placed a statue of the Duke of Rutland, the Spitalfields trophy, the herse and dragon, Canadian timber, marble dog, specimens of stone carving, console table and glass, specimens of crystallization, cross in Caen stone, &c., altar screen, Eldon and Stowell group, Henduras timber, church clock, Elizabethan fountains, models, patent lighthouse, filtering apparatus, sculpture, Coalbrook Dale glass-house, equatorial telescope, Liverpool model, fountain, and lighthouse.

SOFFEERING HALP.

The Avenue, M, N, O, and part of P, proceeding from the west, contain successively printed fabrics of Manches-ter, London, and Glasgow; flax manufactures of Ireland; woollen and mixed fabrics, the productions of Sheffield; furniture; the hardwares of Birmingham; the Medieval court; Australian, Canadian, and East Indian productions.

The avenues Q and R, from west to east, contain in succession, agricultural implements, court for sculpture, part of South Australia, Canada, and the East Indies.

Avenue S is principally occupied by Class 1.

NORTHERN HALF.

The Avenue I, and part of the Central Avenue, proceeding east to west, contain cotton, leather, furs, part of mineral manufactures, furniture, paper, fine arts, Malta, Ceylon, and part of the East Indian articles. The avenues G and H contain carriages, mineral manu-

factures, marine and other engines, Guernsey and Jersey, Fine arts, Maltese and East Indian contributions.

Avenue F is appropriated to locomotive engines and railway mechanism.

Avenues C, D and E contain, in a separate enclosure, cotton and other machinery in motion; beyond this the Western Refreshment Court, machines in motion, lathes and tools, mills, steam-engines, and a part of the East Indian

Avenues A, B, contain cotton machines, woollen machines, flax machinery, silk and lace machinery, paper and printing machines in motion, models and naval architec-

GALLERIES.

The Galleries are named, respectively, South, Central South, Central North, and North.

The portions of the West (South) Galleries, near the

Transept, South Entrance, are occupied by shawls.

South Galley, P.—Proceeding from east to west, contains silks, chemical substances, substances used as food, vegeta-

ble and animal substances, naval architecture, guns, &c.

The interval between the west termination of the South
Gallery, and that of the Central South, is occupied by naval,
and other models.

and other modes.

Central South Gelley, M.—Proceeding from west to east, contains philosophical instruments, precious metals, tapeatry, and silks. The interval between the western termination of the Central South Gallery and that of the Central North is occupied by philosophical and other contrivances, models, &c., and the great organ, which is in the centre.

Central North Galley, L.—From west to east contains whilosophical sweeted and musical instruments, gless, and

philosophical, surgical, and musical instruments, glass, and pottery.

The interval near the Transcopt, between these Galleries,

is occupied by pottery.

North Galley, F.—From east to west, contains pottery, animal and vegetable manufactures, outlery, surgical instru-ments, and models in civil engineering.

The portions of the West (North) Galleries, near the

Transept, North Entrance, are occupied by pottery.

Immediately over the South Entrance, in the Gallery, is

the apparatus connected with the large electric clock.

RASTERS HALF .- Ground Floor.

The Nave, or Central Avenue, contains the Great Dismond, Sculpture, Wine-Jars from Spain, Artillery, Sculptures, Statue of Michael and Satan, Parisian Organ, Colossal Statue of Godfrey de Bouillon, Stained Glass Window, Amazon, Colossal Lion, Church Bell, Group of Horses, block of Zinc Ore.

The southern half of the ground-floor space is occupied,

HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN.

Jewel case in the cinque cento style, designed by L. Gruser, Esq., and executed at the manufactory of Mr. Hesry Elkington, at Birmingham. The material is bronze, glit and silvered by electro-type process; upon this case are portsaits on china of Her Majesty, H.H.H. Prince Albert, and H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, copied from miniatures by E. Thorburn, Req., A.R.A. The small medallions, representing profiles of their R.H.'s the Princes and Princesses, were modelled from life by Leonard Wyon,

Table of gold and silver electro-plate, manufactured by Massa. Elkington. The top of the table is an electro-type repeatuction of a plate of fine workmanship, obtained and copied for Mr. H. Elkington under the direction of the Chevalier de Schlick. The eight subjects in bas-relief represent Minerva, Astrologia, Geometrica, Arithmetica, Musica, Rhetorica. The centre figure represents Temperance surrounded by the four elements. At the bottom of this plate is an inscription pointing to the artist. The table is designed by George Stanton, a young artist in the employ of Mr. H. Elkington, and a student in the Eirmingham School of Design.

Pertrait of Her Majesty on Sevres china, size of life, half length, by A. Ducluscau, after a portrait by F. Winter-halter. Painted in 1846.

Petrait of H.B.H. Prince Albert, on Sèvres china, size of His, half length, painted by A. Bezanget, after a portrait by F. Winterhalter. These portraits are exhibited jointly by Her Majesty and H.B.H. Prince Albert.

A cradia, carved in Turkey boxwood by W. G. Rogers, and designed by his son, symbolising the union of the Royal House of England with that of Saxe Coburg and Gotha. One and exh. Jits in the centre the armorial bearings of Her Majesty the Queen, surrounded by masses of foliage, natural flowers and birds; on the rocker, beneath, is seen the head of "Nox," represented as a beautiful sleeping female, crewesed with a garland of poppies, supported upon bats wings, and surrounded by the seven planets.

The other end, or the back of the head of the cradle, is

The other end, or the back of the head of the cradle, is deveted to the arms of H.R.H. Prince Albert; the shield occupies the centre, and round it, among the arabesque

foliage, the six crests of the Prince are scattered, with the motto "True und fest." Below, on the rocker, is discovered a head of "Sommus" with closed eyes, and over the chin a wimple, which, on each side, terminates in popular

In the interior of the head of the cradle, guardism angels are introduced; and above, the royal crown is found embedded in foliage. The friezes, forming the most important part of the sides of the body of the cradle, are composed of roses, poppies, conventional foliage, butterfiles, and birds, while beneath them rise a variety of pinks, studied from nature. The edges and the insides of the rockers are enriched with the insignia of royalty and emblems of repose.

A Berlin-wool carpet executed by one hundred and fifty ladies of Great Britain. The dimensions of this carpet are thirty feet in the length, and twenty in breadth. The carpet has been produced in the following mamer:—The pattern, originally designed and painted by the artist, has been subdivided into detached squares, which have been worked by different ladies, and on their completion the squares have been reunited, so as to complete the design. In the pattern, which consists partly of geometrical, and partly of floral forms, heraldic emblems are also introduced. The initials of the executants are ornamentally arranged, so as to form the external border. The whole design is connected by wreaths or bands of leaves and foliage, the centre group representing the store from whence they have been distributed.

The carpet has been produced under the management of a Committee. The design by Mr. J. W. Papworth; the patterns were painted and the work executed under the super-intendence of Mr. W. B. Simpson.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS PRINCE ALBERT.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS PRINCE ALBERT, ON BEHALF OF HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES.

Shield presented by His Majesty the King of Pruseia to His Royal Highness the Prince of Welles, in commemoration of the baptism of the infant Prince, for whom His Majesty acted as sponsor.

The pictorial embellishments of the shield, the general plan for which was given by the king himself, were designed by Doctor Peter Von Cornelius, and the architectural ornsments by Counsellor Stüler. The execution of the remaining portions—goldsmiths work, enamel, i.e., was performed by M. G. Hossauer; the modelling by M. A. Fischer; the chasing by M. A. Mortens; and the lapidary work by M. Calandrelli.

In the centre of the shield is a head of our Saviour. The middle compartment, surrounded by a double line of ornamental work, is divided by a cross into four smaller compariments, which contain emblematic representations of the two Sacraments, Baptism, and the Lord's Supper, with their Old Testament types—the opening of the fountain in the rock by Moses, and the fall of manns. At the extremities of the arms of the cross are represented the Evangelists, noting down what they have seen and heard in the Gospels, which are to communicate to all futurity the plan of man's salvation, and prove inexhaustible sources of divine revelation and doctrine.

On the extreme points of the arabesques that rise above the Evangelists, are represented the Christian virtues of Faith, Hope, and Charity, and of Christian Righteous-ness. Around the entire centre stand in a circle the twelve

Apostles. Peter is seen under Faith represented in the arabesque; on the right and left of him are Philip and Andrew; under Hope is James; on either side are Bartholomew and Simon; John is placed beneath the figure of Charity; on either side are James the younger and Thomas; under Righteousness is Paul; on the right and left are Matthew and Judas Thaddeus, going forth into the world to teach and to baptize, and to propagate the kingdom of the Redeemer.

The relieve which runs round the edge of the shield, represents the betrayal, the redoming atonement of Christ, and his resurrection. Another portion represents our Lord's triumphant entry into Jerusalem; a third portion the descent of the Holy Ghost, the preaching of the Gospel, and the for-mation of the Church. The fourth and principal compartment contains an allegorical representation of the birth of the Prince of Wales and of the visit of the king of Prussia, accompanied by Baron Humboldt, General von Natsmer, and the Count von Stolberg, and welcomed by His Royal Highness Prince Albert and the Duke of Wellington: a knight of St. George being represented on the beach

standing upon a dragon.

The shield has been denominated the Buckler of Faith. The inscription on the shield runs thus:

"PRIDERICUS GULTELMUS REX BORUSSORUM, ALBERTO EDUARDO, PRINCIPI WALLIE. IN MEMORIAM DIEL. BAPT. XXV. JAN. A. MDOCCELIL."

These aprons are the ordinary work and every-day wear of the peasant-girls of Corfu. The dress of the Greek peasant women, in general, being of an extraordinary richness, so that a peasant-bride's dress is often her dowry. being not unfrequently worth 400 or 500 dollars.

infancy, and has only lately been commenced.

About 300 acres of ground have been planted in the cooler districts of Mauritius with mulberry trees, which have rapidly grown up, and are now fit for use. A company has been formed in Mauritius by the exertions of Mr. Evena Dupont, a barrister and planter there, called the "Flature Centrale." An experienced "fileuse," Madame Boddieu, has been engaged from the neighbouring island of Bourbon, and is now giving instruction to various proprietors. Some ten persons rear worms and send to the Company regular supplies of cocoons, and eighty-seven other proprietors have received cocoons and mulberry cuttings from the Company. It is considered that this manufacture will flourish and increase rapidly in the island, and form eventually an important branch of trade, the climate and the soil being peculiarly suitable to the profitable rearing of the silkworm. From Bourbon it is stated by the corsespondent, Mr. Dupont, that silk was sent to Paris of such fine quality as to fetch 111 france per kilogramme, or about 21. 4s. the pound.

ANIMAL KINGDOM

Tortoiseshell: the hawk's-bill turtle is caught on all the coasts of Trinidad and the Gulph of Paria; the shell forms

an article of export.

Whale oil: the whale is caught in the Gulph of Paria; it usually makes its appearance about January, when the fishing season begins, and lasts till June; from 12 to 18 fish are caught annually, each giving from 60 to 80 barrels of oil.

VEGETABLE KINGDOM.—(Oils and Fatty Substances.) Cocce-nut-oil: a large quantity of this oil is made in the island, chiefly on the east coast

Carap oil: this oil is made from the seeds of a common Indigenous tree, called Carapa Guianensis.

Cooos fat: this butter-like substance is obtained from the seeds of Theobroma Cacao, and is esteemed as an emollient.

Spices. Nutmegs: the nutmegs grown in Trinidad are equal to any from the East. The annual produce per tree varies from 10 to 15 lbs.

Cloves: this tree bears an abundant crop twice in the year; the produce is of good quality.

Black pepper: which thrives well, and is very prolific. Cayenna pepper: the smaller kinds of capsicum (bird epper) are like weeds in point of abundance, and when dried and ground, make good cayeane pepper.

Vanilla: there are three different species of vanilla, all producing this pod, and all indigenous to the colony.

Fibres

Cotton, although not cultivated for many years, readily suits itself to the soil and climate; the specimen sent is grown from that variety called sea island cotton, a few seeds of which were imported from Jamaica.

Bromelia (Karatta): this plant is indigenous to the island, and, like all the pine-apple tribe, furnishes a strong and soft

Sterculia (Caribaa or Majagua): the bark of this tree furnishes the country people with cordage, and is strong.

Agave (Vivipara or Langue beng): all the species of agave furnish a white, but somewhat harsh or brittle fibre.

AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS. Sugar (Muscocado): this is the chief staple product of the colony, and great exertions are being made to improve its

quality. Rice: this article is productive in any part of the island,

whether the land be high or low.

Cassava starch: is the produce of Jatropha manihot (or bitter cassava). This plant is extensively cultivated.

Arrowroot: the produce of Maranta arundinaces, and other species.

Tous-les-mois, or tulema: gives also a large return of starch; it is said that the produce per acre, in good soil, is equal to that of sugar from the sugar-cane, viz., from one to two tone per scre

Brazil nuts: the produce of Bertholettia excelsa. The tree has been introduced from South America, and is ornamental and useful.

Tonquin bean: from the tree Dipterix odorata, which was introduced from British Guiana.

Indian corn, or maize.

Coffee (Mocha): this variety of coffee has been introduced some years, and preserves, in cultivation, its peculiarly small round grain.

Theobroma, cacao, or cocca: this tree is extensively cul-tivated; its produce forms a large article of export. Cocca, or chocolate manufactured.

Tobacco, in the leaf, from Siparia.

Tobacco, manufactured, from the same place.

Gene and Resine.

Gum-anime: from Arima, the produce of Hymeness Courbaril, or loonst-tree.

Incense: the produce of Trichilla trinitensis.

Medicinal Products. Sarsaparilla: the root of a species of Smilax, and abundant.

Turneric, logwood, and fustic.

Woods for Ornamental and other Purposes. Hymenses courberil, or locust: a valuable timber, and abundant, which grows from two to six feet in diameter.

Yoke: a handsome wood, analogous to mahogany, usually from two to three feet diameter.

Cedreia odorata cedar: West Indian cedar; a useful and ornamental timber, from three to twelve feet in diameter.

Rhopala montana (Agustapana): a very durable wood, and taking a fine polish; from 18 inches to three feet in diameter.

Tapana: used for felloes of wheels, and where strength and toughness is required.

Cordia (or Sepe); a useful light wood, analogous to English elm in texture, and possessing a bitter principle, which

deters insects; from one to two feet in diameter.

Acaras (Balata): a timber much used; from two to six feet in diameter.

Achras (Acoma or Mastic): like the timber of the whole family of Sapotacles, much valued; from two to four feet in diameter.

Achres (Zapotilla or Zapodilla).

Astrocaryum aculeatum (Gri Gri): this, like most of the palm tribe, furnishes good material for veneering. Acrocomia solerocarpa (Gra Gra): a wood similar to the

Carapa guianensis (or Carapa): a useful timber, analogous to cedar; from two to three feet in diameter.

4 Sassafras of Tasmania (Atheroperma moschata). Squared log 13 ft. long, 12 ins. by 12 ins. A soft, even, and closegrained timber, well adapted for turning and, probably, for the carver. Has been used for flooring-boards and in the inside work of houses, and for cabin fittings in ships. Obtainable in any quantity, of moderate dimensions.

5 Myrtle of Tasmania (Fagus Cassinghami). Squared log 12 ft. long, 12 ins. by 12 ins. This timber is plentiful, and may be obtained of any size. It is hard and closegrained, with a lively red tint, streaked and mottled near

the root; takes a beautiful polish.

The myrtle of Van Dieman's Land often composes dense forests of many miles, and the individual trees in such situations attain a girth of 30 to 40 feet with a proportionate elevation. The wood is of a fresh pink colour when newly hewn, and the wood part is often very beautifully veined and watered, fitting it admirably for showy picture-frames, and such like cabinet-work.

Corrow.—Cotton spinning and weaving has of late years been greatly on the increase in Austria, owing to the de-mand for home consumption. Bohemia, Lower Austria, and Voralberg, in the Tyrol, contain most of the spinning-mills; Bohemia has by far the greatest number of establishments for weaving and printing. The erection of powerlooms has not been extensive, the greatest part of the articles produced being woven by hand by the inhabitants of the Bohemian mountain-frontier districts. The production of cotton yarn and goods has increased of late years in a measure which bears no proportion to the small number of the samples exhibited.

WOOLLER AND WORSTED GOODS (including fabrics mixed with cotton, flax, and silk shawls). — The production of wool and woollens is a most important branch of industry, and its export trade is only exceeded by that of silk goods. raw material of which, besides a large quantity exported, is entirely of home growth. Nearly half the wool of Austria is Hungarian; next in importance are Bohemia, Galicia, Moravia, Silesia, Transylvania, Upper and Lower Austria. The woollen yarns are usually spun in the cloth manufactories, and several spinning-mills have been lately establisbed.

The manufacture of woollens is chiefly carried on in Bohemia, Moravia, and Upper and Lower Austria. The most important places in this respect are Reichenberg, in Bohemia, Brünn, Iglau and Bielitz, in Moravia, and Vienna.

The shawls, which are manufactured almost exclusively at Vienna, combine durability and tastefulness with clicapness, and have long been extensive export articles.

Some specimens of woollens mixed with cotton, silk, and thread, as well as carpets and similar articles, are exhibited.

SILK AND SILK GOODS.—The raw material of this important branch of Austrian industry is chiefly produced in the Lombardo-Venetian provinces and the Tyrol. In Hungary, and the military frontiers, also, the silkworm-breeding, for years fostered by Government, has met with great success, and the silk produced, which is of a good quality, is largely exported.

The manufacture of silk goods is chiefly carried on in Vienna, Milan, and Como, and there are also various manufactories in the smaller towns of Lower Austria and the Tyrol. With the exception of a few very fine articles, they supply the home-market entirely, and export large quanti-

ties, especially of the lighter descriptions of goods.

MANUFACTURES FROM FLAX AND HEMP.—Although the specient and, in former times, flourishing linea trade of Austria has suffered greatly by the introduction and proress of the cotion manufacture, and spinning by machinery, it still occupies an important position, and the lines of the mountain districts of Bohemia, Moravia, Silesia, and Salsburg is of undeniable excellence. The government is also constantly exerting its influence for the improvement of the growing and preparation of flax.

Among the hemp manufactures, of which specimens have been sent, some are distinguished by their novelty, as for example, variegated coloured hemp thread for ladies' fancy work, frequently preferred to silk.

The linen yarns of Austria are mostly hand-spun; machine-spinning is, however, on the increase. Samples are exhibited both of hand and machine spun yarns.

LEATHER AND BLANUFACTURES.—The manufacture of lea-

ther in Austria is extensive. A superior article is produced in Bohemia and Lower Austria, the principal seats of the manufacture. The Bohemian giove leather, of goat, lamb, and sheep-skins is of good quality. Also in japanned calf-skins, fine coloured and split Russian and morocoo leathers, progress to a considerable extent has been made.

The manufacture of gloves at Vienna employs a large number of hands, particularly women, and the exports are considerable. In Prague also, fine gloves are made. Ordinary kinds of so-called washing gloves are made on a large scale in several smaller towns in Bohemia.

For harness-makers', saddlers', and trunk-makers' work,

Vienna has likewise a good reputation.

Bookbinding and fancy-work in leather are of some importance in Vienns. Durability, good tasts, and moderate prices have made them articles of export to Germany and Italy.

PAPER, TYPOGRAPHY, ENGRAVING, PAPER-HANGINGS, AND DRAWING MATERIALS.—The paper manufacture in Austria takes no inconsiderable place in the industry of the empire. With the exception of the finest sorts of letter-papers (principally the ornamented and coloured), and some particular kinds of fac tissue paper, the production is not only suffi-cient for the home demand, but also for exportation.

Lombardy, Bohemia, and Lower Austria, are the principal seats of paper manufacture. The ample quantity and the good quality of the raw material, principally supplied by Hungary, and the superior mode of manufacture, will

sufficiently explain the progress of this branch.

The same may be said of paper-hangings, a trade which, by the enterprise of the manufacture, is flourishing. A considerable quantity is exported from Vienna to Italy.

Playing-cards are also largely manufactured.

Typography in Austria has of late years been greatly improved in all its branches, and now assumes a very high position.

Specimens of engravings on steel and copper, and litho-graphy, are exhibited, and the maps especially are worthy of notice.

The iren productions of the Austrian empire may be divided into that of the Alpine countries (Styria, the Tyrel, Carniols, Upper and Lower Austria, and Lombardy); of the mountain districts of Bohemia, Moravia, and Silesia; and of the Carnethian countries (Hungary, Galicia, and Transylvania). The nature of the ore in Bohemia and Moravia, as also in the Carpathian countries, is more fit for the production of cast-iron and articles made from the same, whilst the Alpine countries have mainly devoted themselves to the production of steel and wrought-iron.

The exhibition affords a comprehensive idea of this important department of Austrian industry. Almost every part of it is represented; Bohemia, Moravia, Styria, Lower Austria, the Tyrol, Carniola, and Carinthia having sent specimens of their several iron productions, commencing with the raw produce in different stages of preparation; next follow the sheet-iron and wires, and finally the finished

manufactures.

The Austrian iron, and particularly the Austrian steel (called in England Milan steel) is acknowledged to be of superior quality, in consequence of which so great a demand for the latter has been created abroad, that the manufacturers of soythes, among others, complain of want of material.

Hitherto charcoal has been mostly used in the iron works,

but coals are beginning to take its place; and also all the new improvements in smelting and refining are being

ARTICLES IN COMMON METALS AND THEIR ALLOYS.—The sanufacture of articles in pewter, lead, copper, brass, pinchbeck, bell-metal, German silver, albata, bronze, gilt, silvered and plated metals has its principal seat in Vienna. They are either articles for use or ornament. The former, of copper, brass, &c., are very substantially made, and not only supply the home market, but are also extensively exported. The export trade of Vienna in gold and silver fancy articles has for some years been considerable, great taste having been combined with solidity. Also the manu-

facture of cast and embossed articles of bronze, gilt, is flourishing, and gives employment to a large number of

SCYTHES, SICKLES, AND STRAW-CUTTERS.—The importance of these articles, as well as the prominent position of the manufacture of them in Austria, is generally known. The Austrian scythe and sickle find their way into almost every country in Europe, and almost across the Atlantic. The reason of this is to be found in the excellence of the meterial, the lowness of the price, and the care with which

they have been made for centuries.

The principal seat of the manufacture is Upper and Lower Austria, Styria, and part of the Tyrol, which furnish nearly

three-fourths of the whole number made.

Stadt Steyer, in Upper Austria, alone furnishes annually nearly two million scythes and sickles; and the whole production of 142 works in the monarchy (not including 34 scythe-factories in Lombardy) amounts to about sevenmillion scythes, sickles, and straw-cutters.

CUTLERY.—The manufacture of cutlery in Austria has its principal seat in Stadt Steyer, Upper Austria, and its neighbourhood. Not only the great extent and importance of the manufacture, but, above all, the excellent quality of the article and the extraordinarily low price, have brought the cutlery of Stadt Steyer into almost universal use throughout the monarchy, and made all competition in the lower and midding kinds of table knives and forks and pocket-knives almost impossible.

The wares universally known under the name of "Steyer cutlery" are not produced by large manufacturing establishments, but principally by small master cutlers; and the division of labour, with respect to the handles, rivets, and blades, has been in practice for many years; a series of specimens of those knives and forks which are principally in demand is exhibited, and attention must be drawn more to the excellence and cheapness of the articles than to their finish.

The manufacture has greatly increased, particularly in the past year.

Of fine cutlery, specimens are exhibited from some establishments in Steyer, as well as from the excellent one of Mr. Rösler, in Nixdorf, Bohemia.

Stadt Steyer also produces weapons, &c., on a large scale, and some samples are exhibited.

Finer kinds of cutting tools are made in Vienna, Lins, and other towns in large quantities.

Ferroginous red oxyde of copper with malachite (green carbonate of copper); the produce of exidation in the upper part of the

copper veins.

Zinc ore, substant of sinc. This ore fills part of the lead veins, and is used of late years for producing sinc metal

only.

Hanganese ore, pyrolusite (the greatest part) and pello-melana, perceptle of manganese. District of Lahn. The mines of manganese ore in Nassan have been opened chiefly within the last 15 years, and yield a vast produce. The quantity reised every year is above 20,000 tons English, and is exported to all quarters of the world. 1,200 persons are employed in the mines and washing-mills. The manganese ore is used for extracting chlorine in the manufacture of da from common salt; for glazing in potteries; for

whitening glass, &c.

Iron ore, red hamstite, red oxide of iron. The red hamatite is raised in numerous mines, in very great quantity; it yields iron of superior quality, in the high furnaces of Nessau, worked with charcoal. This iron ore is also exorted to the coal districts of Germany and to France, for the purpose of improving iron. From 1,500,000 to 2,000,000 owts. of iron ore are raised every year, of which the half is melted in Nassau. Part of the iron ore contains calespar, and is used in that state as the best admixture for smelting. Magnetic fron ore, oxydulated iron. This ore is found united with red harmatite. Hydrous eaide of iron, brown harmatite—atilruosiderite. This ore is found in Nassan in great quantities; it is chiefly worked for exportation, and is used especially for producing hard steel-iron. Spathose iron; from Hachenburg. There are only a few mines of spathose iron in Nassau, near the Pressian country of Slegen; the ore, and the steel produced from it are esteemed.

Bituminous coal; lignite-of remerkable wood-like character, covering a space of about 100 Kagiich square miles; used in Nassan and the neighbouring countries as the principal household fuel. For technical uses the lignite is valuable. At present the yearly produce amounts to 1,300,000 cwin, but the quantity which can be reised is incalculable.

State. The mines of slates in Nassau near the Rhine and

Lahn are of good quality.

Heavy Spar, suphate of barytes. Formely not worked in great quantities, but new discoveries of rich veins promise a considerable produce. The heavy spar is used as the basis for many corts of colours, in order to give them more body. White lead is very commonly adulterated with heavy spar. The heavy spar is also used in potteries for glazing, and mixing with elsy.

Fuller's earth. In some parts of the country worked for a long period. Extensive deposits have been recently found a other districts.

Potter's clay, and coloured earth; Ochra. Nassan is very rich in potter's clay, of the best quality; it is partly exported in a raw state under the name of Valendar clay. The manufacture of earthenware in Nassan is succeptible of greater development; a great drawback hitherto laving been the cost of fuel. These clays are manufactured into stone-ware cruets, pots, cans, jugs, and hydraulic pipes of great solidity. There are also some manufactories of Fayence and fine pottery ware, clay tobacco pipes, and common earthenware.
